

I agree with the first reviewer. As I read the book I saw it as a movie in my mind complete with soundtrack from lyrics used in the book. The story is achingly beautiful. I was entranced. An older man sits alone in his library and opens a book of poetry to find within letters from a long lost love. He begins to realize that she was a pivotal influence in his personal as well as professional career as a Pulitzer prizewinning journalist. The letters, for me, revealed an unforgettable woman in Yukiko. Her self-effacing Asian femininity subtly and gradually revealed a depth of wisdom, courage and strength. Such qualities are not often acknowledged by Westerners. At least for me, it was a revelation and provoked an admiration for the character and the culture from which she sprang. The book is dedicated by the author to "Those Japanese women from all walks of life who with grace, warmth, and kindness helped Japan rise to new greatness after the disaster of World War II." A tribute that is probably long overdue. In addition, the story chronicles life aboard a US Navy aircraft carrier that visited Yokosuka in the summer of 1959. Were you in the Navy at that time? If so, you'll readily identify with the very funny description of a young British immigrant sailor experiencing naval culture during the Cold War. His forays with his friends into the fleshpots of Hong Kong were

especially charming, and I use the word because they were all so young and inexperienced (I am a woman). How did this young sailor start his journalistic career on board ship? He was chosen because he could spell the word "apprentice." This is much more than just a "romance." It has the depth and quality of fine literature. Lots of drama, humor, passion, and historical background combined with fabulous writing will leave you breathless and just waiting and hoping for the movie.

I just completed "Please Enjoy Your Happiness". by Paul Brinkley-Rogers. I am not exaggerating to say: To miss it is to miss one of the most beautiful and enriching love stories I have ever read. Paul's masterly use of images and his tender heartedness in dealing with a simple encounter as a young man that brought such delight and depth to him and his dear one - left me with the feeling that I had been gifted by the integrity of these two deep friends who truly were in love.
