


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Out From Las Vegas

Nevada is the last great desert frontier in the contiguous United States. North of Las Vegas, where the skies are blue and clear above the sage-covered desert, the Great Basin's range country is defined by alpine environments where aspens and pines shade the traces of last winter's snow on their northern slopes. In contrast, Nevada's basins are decorated by colorful mesas, the autumn leaves of cottonwoods, and herds of wild horses that inspired great artists like Maynard Dixon, who traveled from San Francisco across California to Nevada in the 1920s to paint them. Anyone who views Nevada as a vast desolate wasteland is very wrong -- it is simply an incredibly beautiful place. We thank our readers who sent us their field notes regarding inaccessibility to areas due to new construction and private property closures, damage to areas from vandalism, littering, and "rogue" off-road vehicle use. Several trips in the first edition have been removed because they no longer exist, replaced by new streets and neighborhoods. Routes like Brownstone Canyon have been closed due to the access issues of private property. Located in what was once Nevada's largest Anasazi settlement, the thousand year-old Mesa House, in the first edition, was turned to dust by ATVs.
