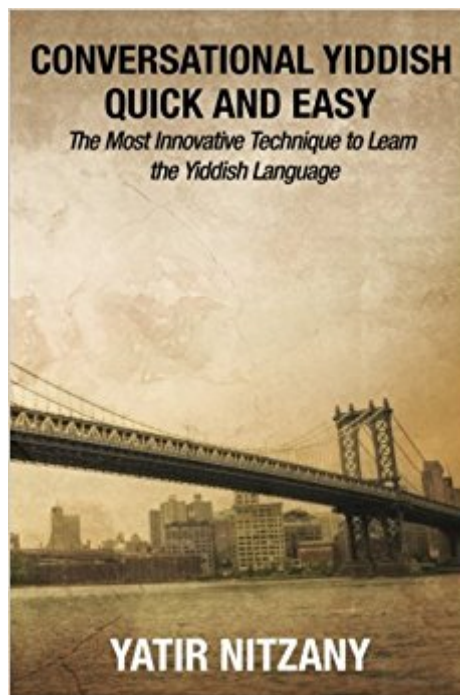




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Conversational Yiddish Quick And Easy: The Most Innovative Technique To Learn The Yiddish Language

Gevalt! Vos far a bukh iz dos? The idea of learning at least 300 words in any language to provide one the ability to communicate with native speakers is not new. I first read of this in a Jerome K. Jerome story, "Three Men on Wheels," written around the turn of the last century. So, I was curious what 300 to 350 words would be listed for Yiddish. Unfortunately the book does not follow YIVO for transliteration. So, if one were to try to look up some of these words, it will be impossible. Take "duce" for instance, which is used as the Yiddish for "this." How is that supposed to be pronounced? Online search revealed nothing. From the context I figured it was supposed to be "dos," which is the correct Yiddish word for "this".(neuter). דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס, דאָס

אָ—אַ“אָ—אַֿאָ—אַ•, are the Yiddish words commonly used for "this." OK not following YIVO is not the greatest error, but the inconsistencies in the spellings make it worse. For instance, the Yiddish for "am" on page 17 is listed as "bin." That's OK and that is actually how YIVO would have spelled it. But on page 21 it is listed as "bien." That is not the only word spelled inconsistently. The grammar is bad, too, OK the author promised not to burden the learner with grammar. Well, truly spoken. But the little grammar in the book, like the conjugation of some of the verbs is wrong. Anyone who speaks with the grammar of this book, will sound like a yokel. It will sound something like, "I is going to seen him." And what is with e'ech for "I?" "i" = ikh, basically the same as the German ich for I. Yiddish = אָ—אַ•אָ—אַ™אָ—אַ for "I" I think this book is not suited for someone who knows no Yiddish. Don't get me wrong. If you, the reader, attended our monthly Yiddish group, you would be very welcome. Please come, join a Yiddish group wherever you are. You might get a few smiles when you try to speak, but no matter.
